The Holy Father's Prayer Intentions
JUNE 2010

General Intention: That every national and transnational institution may strive to guarantee respect for human life from conception to natural death.

Missionary Intention: That the Churches in Asia, which constitute a "little flock" among non-Christian populations, may know how to communicate the Gospel and give joyful witness to their adherence to Christ.

Quotable Quip:

"Ordinary" Time?

It's that time of the year again. Ordinary Time. Ordinary. Plain. Commonplace. Generic. Even though these may be our associations with the word 'ordinary', these are not the ones the Church has for this longest time of the year. We forget the origin of the 'ordinary' is from same root as the word **ordinal**, meaning 'ordered' or 'numbered'. So this is the season that brings order to time!

As the *Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy* says: "Within the cycle of a year, moreover, [as] she unfolds the whole mystery of Christ, the Church opens to the faithful the riches of her Lord's powers and merits, so that these are in some way made present for all time." (#102)

Each Sunday, each week, is ordered. And it is the business of the Liturgy to help us bring order to the world, and order the world toward God's Kingdom.

Friday June 11

Solemnity of the Most Sacred Heart of Jesus

The Church celebrates the Solemnity of the Sacred Heart of Jesus on the Friday following the second Sunday after Pentecost. Jesus, who is one with the Father (cf. John 10:30), invites his disciples to live in close communion with him, to model their lives on him and on his teaching. He, in turn, reveals himself as "meek and humble of heart" (Mt 11:29). It can be said that, in a certain sense, devotion to the Sacred Heart of Jesus is a ritual form of the prophetic and evangelic gaze of all Christians on him who was pierced (cf. John 19:37; Zac 12:10), the gaze of all Christians on the side of Christ, transfixed by a lance, and from which flowed blood and water (cf. John 19:34), symbols of the "wondrous sacrament of the Church"

“The proper or seasonal Responsorial Psalm from the *Lectionary for Mass*, with the congregation singing the response, is to be preferred....because the Psalm is properly a form of sung prayer, every means available is to be employed in fostering the singing of the Psalm at Mass.” *Sing to the Lord: Music in Divine Worship* Issued by United States Conference of Catholic Bishops November 14, 2007.

Blessing of Fathers on Father's Day

(Third Sunday of June)

Prayer Source: *Book of Blessings* by International Commission on English in the Liturgy (ICEL) 1989

1729 **The observance of Father's Day has an important place in American life. Since it is celebrated on the third Sunday in June, the Mass of the Sunday is always celebrated. However, in order to provide some recognition of this holiday, model intercessions and a prayer over the people are provided here.**

1730 **The intercessions are added to those of the day and may be adapted as necessary.**

1731 **The prayer over the people may replace the solemn blessing of the Easter season.**

Intercessions

1732 **The following intercessions may be added to those of the day.**

For our fathers who have given us life and love, that we may show them respect and love, we pray to the Lord. R.

For fathers who have lost a child through death, that their faith may give them hope, and their family and friends support and console them, we pray to the Lord. R.

For fathers who have died, that God may bring them into the joy of his kingdom, we pray to the Lord. R.

Prayer Over the People

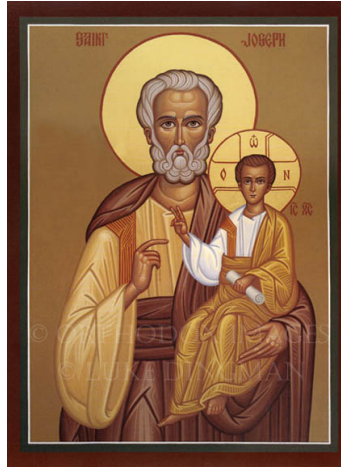
1733 **This prayer over the people may be used at the end of Mass or other liturgical services on Father's Day.**

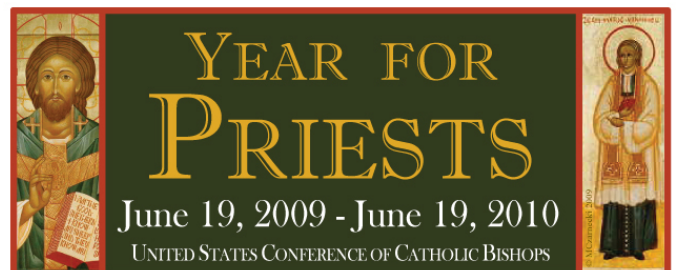

Wednesday June 23 & Thursday June 24 *Solemnity of the Nativity of Saint John the Baptist*

The devotion to St. John the Baptist has been present in the Christian Church since ancient times. From a very early date, it acquired popular forms and connotations. In addition to the celebration of his death (29 August), of all the Saints he is the only one whose birth is also celebrated (24 June) - as with Christ and the Blessed Virgin Mary. **Note there are separate readings and Mass prayers for the Vigil & the Day.**

The Holy Father's Prayer Intentions JULY 2010

Justice in Electing those who Govern

General Intention: That in every nation of the world the election of officials may be carried out with justice, transparency and honesty, respecting the free decisions of citizens.

An Urban Culture of Justice, Solidarity and Peace

Missionary Intention: That Christians may strive to offer everywhere, but especially in great urban centers, an effective contribution to the promotion of education, justice, solidarity and peace.

The Display of Flags in Catholic Churches in the United States of America

The origin of the display of the American flag in many parishes in the United States appears have its origins in the offering of prayers for those who served during the Second World War (1941-1945). At that time, many bishops and pastors provided a book of remembrance near the American flag, requesting prayers for loved ones – especially those serving their country in the armed forces – as a way of keeping before the attention of the faithful the needs of military families. This practice has since been continued in many places until the present.

The Bishops' Committee on the Liturgy has in the past encouraged pastors not to place the flag within the sanctuary itself, in order to reserve that space for the properly sacred furnishings of altar, the ambo, the presidential chair and the tabernacle.

Instead, the suggestion has been made that the American flag be placed outside the sanctuary, or in the vestibule of the Church together with a book of prayer requests for those serving in the armed forces.

For the people of the United States, that we may be united in building a society in which everyone can have the opportunity to live with dignity and hope, we pray to the Lord. . . .



Sunday, July 4 – Fourteenth in OT (C)

Be careful in planning for celebrations of the liturgy today. This is not a chance to open up the section of the hymnal for patriotic songs to the exclusion of the proper texts of the Sunday Liturgy. While there are Mass prayers "for Independence Day and other observances," they are **not** to be used today.

Please make note of the information about displaying the flag in Churches.
